The Architectural Heritage Fund (AHF) is a national charity which exists to promote the conservation and sustainable re-use of historic buildings at risk for the benefit of the public. The AHF provides grants and loans to community groups to support heritage at risk projects. The AHF also provides advice and support to early stage project development and in finding viable new uses for redundant buildings. In addition to the central team, a Regional Support Officer (Josephine Brown) works across the south west region.



ENGLISH HERITAGE

English Heritage publishes the Heritage at Risk Register each year, to provide a list of the heritage sites (including Grade I and II* Listed Buildings and Scheduled Monuments) considered to be at risk through factors such as redundancy and condition. In 2012 English Heritage set themselves the target of removing 25% or 309 buildings or structures from the 2010 Register by 2015. The size of the funding gap and the percentage of buildings without any beneficial use present a real challenge, and partnership is often key to delivering successful projects. Many BPTs are currently working to deliver these projects.

BUILDING PRESERVATION TRUSTS & SOUTH WEST ASSOCIATION OF BUILDING PRESERVATION TRUSTS (SWAPT)

Building Preservation Trusts (BPTs) are not-for-profit organisations which rescue historic buildings for the benefit of the public.



Over 230 BPTs are members of The UK Association of Building Preservation Trusts / www.UKAPT.org.uk

BPTs are organisations driven by local communities for local communities, providing exciting opportunities for local residents to take an active part in their heritage. These organisations make an important contribution to the regeneration of both urban and rural areas, particularly where they focus on iconic landmark buildings. The repair and reuse of historic buildings contributes to economic and social regeneration, enhancing the urban environment, reducing pressure for development on greenfield sites, meeting housing targets and promoting tourism.

In the South West region there are over 50 active BPTs and new ones are coming on line on a regular basis. Most of these new BPT's are single project trusts and 23 of the South West BPTs operate as multi-project trusts. Between them they draw on around 9,500 members, friends and supporters and nearly all trusts are primarily volunteer led. By 2012 over £20m in investment had been attracted to 120 completed projects. *



The South West group (SWAPT) meet three times a year in different locations - an opportunity to see other groups' projects and to discuss strategy and shared concerns. The new Chair, Claire Donovan, has been keen to see more strategic development for the region as a whole and this Heritage Funding Fair is a first step to building capacity and offering training. Support for new groups has been greatly enhanced by Josephine Brown over the last two years. She is the Architectural Heritage Fund Regional Support Officer for the South West and also acts as Secretary for SWAPT. Her guidance and advice is much appreciated.


